


MAP OF WIESBADEN

ABOUT

Research on spatial mobility has experienced a substantial upswing within the social sciences. This development has arisen due to the increasing demands for spatial mobility on the labour markets and the rising importance of multi-local living arrangements due to demographic developments. Two main types of mobility are at the centre of the debate: a change of residence over a socially meaningful distance (migration) and long-distance commuting between place of residence and place of work. From this perspective, a broad agenda of interesting topics arise:

- What forms and patterns of mobility and mobile living arrangements are observed, and how can we explain them?
- Which population groups are spatially mobile, and which groups face mobility restrictions?
- What are the consequences of various forms of spatial mobility for individual life courses and families?
- How does spatial mobility impact cities and regions?

The main goal of the symposium is to promote fruitful research on these questions through an international perspective. The comparison of results from different regions allows the identification of common mobility patterns and trends, whereas differences shed light on the relevance of institutional, cultural and economic influences. The international perspective enriches our empirical and theoretical understanding of mobility processes.

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
